
- * Asked of reproductive age women

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

- Unintended pregnancies are still a major health concern for Oregon women
- Unintended pregnancies lead to
 - + health problems for mother and infant,
 - + social stressors,
 - + financial problems,
 - + increased rates of abortion,
 - + societal costs for social services

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?


- The average American woman desires 2 children, but has 35 years of fertility.
- On average, women spend about 30 years of their lives trying to avoid an unintended pregnancy



OREGON PRAMS DATA, 2007

- * 48% of all births were due to unintended pregnancies
- * 46% of postpartum women who had unintended pregnancies said they and their partners were not doing anything to prevent pregnancy when they conceived
 - +70% of these women gave reasons that indicated they lacked access to comprehensive advice from a clinician

COSTS OF UNINTENDED PREGNANCY California Family PACT Program (Planning, Access, Care and Treatment) × One million women and 100,000 men given contraceptives in 2007 + 296,200 unintended pregnancies were avoided + Each pregnancy averted saved the public sector \$6,557 from conception to age 2 and \$14,111 from conception to age 5 + \$4.2 billion saved overall + ROI \$9.25 for every dollar spent Biggs MA, Foster D6, Hulett D. and Brindis C.
