



National PRC Program

- A network of academic researchers, public health agencies, and community members that conducts applied research in disease prevention and control
- Dominant themes and research networks:
 - Cancer
 - Cardiovascular Disease
 - Diabetes
 - Physical Activity and Obesity
 - Healthy Aging
 - Tobacco
 - STD/HIV and Teen Pregnancy
- New Thrust: Comparative Effectiveness Research (\$4M to four centers)

Unique Aspects

- Population-based
- Community-Based Participatory Research
- Focus on effectiveness research and establishing best practices (e.g., CDC Community Guide)
 - Adoptable interventions (NOT Not on Tobacco Cessation Program for teens, CATCH – Physical Activity and Diet in Elementary School Children)
 - Effective interventions (Worksite Parenting Program for teen sexual health)
 - Promising interventions (Clinicians counseling for Overweight in young patients)
- Emphasis on policy change in systems


National Community Committee www.cdc.gov/prc/community-voice/index.htm

- Build research capacity for chronic disease prevention through training programs, mentoring, and provision of technical assistance
- Conduct high-quality, community-driven prevention research that will translate into policy or practice

Establish our Center as a regional resource for public health research

Foster population health sciences and prevention sciences within OHSU as a major research agenda

Reduce the disease burden of the diseases determined by our partner communities to be of highest priority

- Prevention of progression of retinopathy in diabetic patients
- Nonmydriatic fundus camera
- Telemedicine
- Continued follow-up of over 400 patients
