Assessing the Burden of Breast Cancer among Women in Oregon: Identifying Priority Populations for Action

TOPIC/TARGET AUDIENCE: Reducing Cancer Disparities through Statewide Screening Programs

ABSTRACT: Introduction: From 2006-2010 breast cancer rates have steadily decreased in Oregon and nationally2. However, Oregon has an incidence rate significantly higher than the national rate1. Women of color, low-income and uninsured women, women who are rurally located experience a disproportionate burden of breast cancer incidence and late stage diagnosis. Evidence-based targeted outreach and screening programs can lead to early detection and improved outcomes by reducing the incidence of late stage diagnosis.

Methods: Susan G Komen recently conducted an extensive community profile in which they assessed the current state of breast cancer among Oregon women. SEER, NAACR, and NCI state cancer profile data for years 2006-2010 was analyzed and used to identify priority populations for action.

Results: We found that women of color were at higher risk for late stage disease diagnosis and poorer outcomes. Also, women in Curry and Linn counties experience a greater burden of disease.

Conclusion: The data revealed three target communities with low screening rates, high rates of latestage diagnosis, and a need for better education and outreach to improve breast health knowledge, awareness, and outcomes.
